Rear View Mirror



There is much to see and do within 50 miles of home. In fact, we have discovered with each Surf N’ Safari how many of our own club members have never seen some of the sights that we take our guests to see.

Since buying our first Miata and joining the San Diego Miata Club, Laurie and I have done more and more driving with our friends. In May of 2011 we joined Mark and Cathy Booth as they lead a bunch of us on the complete length of historic Route 66. I was

encouraged to do so by my recollections from my childhood of traveling the old road with my parents. However, the experience was one that I have told anyone who will listen, changed my view of how to take a vacation. Without rehashing the whole thing, I became enthralled with small town America, and traveling with friends. As my daughter tells anyone who will listen, “dad will talk to anyone.” Yeah, I guess that is true. But, how do you learn about anything without talking to someone. I hated history books.

2014 Was a Big Year for Waid Road Trips

There were some short road trips last year beginning with the annual Coastal Cruise which is only 4 days and a little over 1,000 miles. last year was the first Winter Retreat put on by SOCALM, and we saw more of Central California and drove another 1,000 miles with Miata friends. July brought the annual Flyin’ Miata Summer Camp in Grand Junction, Colorado that added another 2,100 miles and 7 days of driving with Miata Friends. A whole lot of you joined in as we drove to Miatas at Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca on the Monterey Peninsula for the revealing of the 2016 ND Miata. Laurie and I both drove our cars and added about 1,100 miles each to our annual log.

All of this was just a precursor to a road trip that we had been planning for a number of years but kept delaying for several reasons. Six days after returning from MRLS, we headed east joined by Daryled and Carlan Bristol. This would not be a Miata road trip, however it was a Mazda road trip as we each drove our Mazda CX-5s.

Although, we split off from the Bristol's after 3 weeks, we were able to share some road trip experiences that seem to always be more memorable when you can laugh with someone else during the unexpected moments.

Road trip statistics

I kept track of some travel statistics that always impress me, even if no one else cares. So, if you don't care you can skip the paragraph. The total trip for Laurie and I (Daryled and Carlan would have slightly different numbers) was 8,415 miles driven by me. It took 31 days. The car averaged 31.9 MPG for the trip. almost 120 people registered at the resort for the event representing nearly 230 room nights.
